RACCOONS

SEE SOMETHING...SAY SOMETHING...

Every month we will focus on specific pests that plague residents here in the Northwest. This month we will focus on Raccoons. Raccoons are a year-round issue, but the increase of garbage and food scraps during the holiday season might encourage more raccoons to come around.

Raccoons may seem cute and cuddly, but they can be really dangerous if cornered or with their young. Please keep in mind that these are wild animals and should be treated as such. Raccoons can carry harmful diseases such as roundworm and rabies; which makes them more likely to attack a person.

To prevent raccoons from being a problem in your area make sure all trash is being placed in the trash cans and not on the ground next to it. This will limit the raccoons' access to the food waste. Also, do not leave pet food out at night as this gives access for any wildlife (including rats) to receive a quick and easy meal. Keeping a clean property will help tremendously in keeping the pests away.
