
COMPUTER LAB @ NE GYM!!!

PAYMENT PROCESS:

All rent payments made to Puyallup Tribal Housing are distributed in a specific order to cover all charges to the account. Payments are first applied to any work orders that are outstanding. The late fees are then paid, followed by any payback agreements, and then the rent that is owed. This is the process for every payment submitted. Please keep this in mind when budgeting for your rent each month. Knowing this process may help with any confusion. Please contact your RS for all payment concerns and questions that you may have.



LICE

SEE SOMETHING ... SAY SOMETHING ...

Every month we will focus on specific pests that plague residents here in the Northwest. This month we will focus on Lice. With school starting children and adults may be at a higher risk of contracting lice. Here are a couple tips if/when this happens.

Lice can be found on the head of humans. They will be located behind the ears and around the neckline in the back of the head. Head lice are more active at night. They feed on the blood of the host and will live close to the scalp to do so.

Lice are mostly found in child care and elementary school settings, as well as the household of infested children. Head lice cannot hop or fly. They move by crawling but can move fairly quickly. They will spread by direct contact with an infested persons hair. It is uncommon for them to be passed through clothing or other personal items.

To get rid if lice a specific lice shampoo must be applied to kill the adult lice and the eggs. A couple of treatments may be needed if the individual has long hair. You will also need to wash all clothing and bedding in hot water as well as vacuum all rooms.
