# Tribal Council swears in members, selects leadership

Sylvia Miller, Anna Bean and Fred Dillon took the oath of office for Puyallup Tribal Council on Thursday, June 10, beginning three-year terms as part of the Tribe's seven-person governing body.

The short ceremony took place outdoors at the entrance to the I-5 Emerald Queen Casino, which opened to the public almost exactly one year ago, on June 8, 2020. The backdrop was a 174.5-foot-long by 30-foot-high mural by Anthony Duenas that depicts bone games.

The ceremony was livestreamed, with COVID-19 precautions in place to protect the community. It included songs and dances by the Tribe's Language and Culture programs, remarks by each of the newly elected council members and prayers by Culture Director Connie McCloud.

"Remember why we're here today," McCloud said. "Each and every one of us have a purpose for our people."

The Tribe's general election took place June 4. Sylvia Miller, whose reelection extends a tenure on Council that dates to the late 1990s, has for years been Council's natural resources and wildlife representative. She was elected vice chairwoman by her fellow councilmembers last year.

She said it was an honor to serve the tribe over the years, and that she will do her best to support the tribe in any way she can.

"I will continue to fight hard for our fishing, and I hope that each and every one of you will join us because we can't do it by ourselves," Miller said. "We're a family, and families should stick together."

Anna Bean was elected to her second term. Before winning her first term in 2018, she worked for many years in the Emerald Queen Casino's Human Resources Department.

She said it's an honor to serve Tribal Members, and said that she would like to focus her next term on healing the community.



















"I look forward to healing our traumas and hurt, and making our ancestors proud," she said.

Fred Dillon, who was elected to his first term on Council, has worked most recently as natural resources policy representative in the Tribe's Fisheries Department.

"I'm truly humbled and grateful and honored to be able to represent each and every one of us," Dillon said. "I look forward to be able to bring to the table a lot of my ideas, a lot of my strengths a lot of my passions to be able to protect and preserve our people for our people."

In Tribal Council's first meeting following the swearing-in, councilmembers chose Bill Sterud to continue serving as chairman and Sylvia Miller to serve as vice chairwoman for the coming year. Sterud and Miller were selected for those roles after last year's election, as well.

Sterud represented the Tribe in negotiations that led to the Puyallup Land Claims Settlement in the 1980s, setting the foundation for much of the Tribe's work today. His tenure on Council extends to the late 1970s, and he has had a hand in every aspect of the Tribe's economic development, including its casinos, cannabis enterprise, marina, gas tax and putting land into trust.

He has served as chairman many times over the years, and said it was an honor to be chosen for the role again.

Admin building.
















# Chairman goes on TV to discuss Electron fine

## Tribe wins court order to stop Electron Hydro from opening fish-killing dam's water intake

'This ruling is a major win,' Tribal Council says

On June 21, a federal court judge issued an order blocking Electron Hydro from opening a water intake as it stumbles through attempts to get the dam operational.

"We argued that opening the intake would kill more fish, and we asked the judge to issue a preliminary injunction to keep the dam owners from opening that intake until they get the right permits," the Tribal Council said in a statement. "In his ruling, the judge cited much of the evidence given by our Fisheries experts, who spent hours detailing impacts to fish and our Membership. ...We are grateful the court agreed that the evidence was clear. The dam kills fish, and opening that intake would kill more fish."

The Puyallup River is home to Chinook salmon, which are important to Tribal and

non-Tribal fishers alike and a critical food source of endangered Southern Resident orcas. The river is also home to steelhead and bull trout. All three species are protected under the Endangered Species Act. The century-old dam has long been a killer of salmon and has never complied with the Endangered Species Act.

In July 2020, the company began the first phase of construction to improve efficiencies at the dam under a series of local, state, and federal permits. Within the first two weeks of the multi-week project, the company had violated every one of its permits. The company placed thousands of square yards of artificial turf into the Puyallup River. The action released crumb rubber and turf mats for miles downstream. Within the last few weeks. the continued river surveys conducted by Tribal biologists have found large turf mats, one measuring 32 square feet, are still strewn along the entire river downstream of the dam. The same month it dropped artificial turf into the water, the company conducted maintenance of the dam's forebay. That action killed thousands of fish. The Tribe filed suit in December under the Clean Water Act and Endangered Species Act.

Since then, the company has tried to salvage the failing, century-old dam. It illegally drove a rock structure and steel sheet pile into the riverbed to try to stabilize the failing dam, which remains in place today and is called a threat to both upstream and downstream migrating species by federal agencies. It still hasn't secured permits for the work for the fish-killing rock structure.

Opening the intake would let Electron Hydro generate a small amount of power. The Tribe says that opening the intake would also suck in protected fish, injuring and killing them in the process. After the project prohibited most threatened Chinook from reaching their spawning habitat upstream of the facility, the Tribe's biologists expect far less outmigrating Chinook during this year's juvenile migration period, which is already underway. Opening the intake now would kill what limited fish are migrating past the facility. Further, by opening the intake, the project would take water from the river, lowering river levels, which will dewater existing steelhead redds already in the river, killing tens of thousands of fertilized steelhead eggs and juvenile fish. The Tribe says it also would threaten Chinook salmon which will begin to return to spawn in the near future.

"This ruling is a major win," the Council said. "The fish can't speak for themselves. We have to do it for them. We are fighting for them and for you."

On May 21, the Puyallup Canoe Family welcomed House of Tears Carvers, traveling with their 22-foot totem pole more than 5,000 miles across the United States and Canada.

The words shared that day were impactful. Our guests spoke about things that continue to affect our Indigenous communities, such as pipelines and fossils fuels, much like our neighbor Puget Sound Energy's liquefied natural gas project, which intends to open the facilities on our ancestral lands. The community spoke about boarding schools and the many children that didn't make it home. The carvers explained the red handprints they added to represent the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW).

The intertribal community shared songs. Eagles flew above, offering a blessing to many.

Council members Annette Bryan and Anna Bean were in attendance. Both shared heartfelt words with our visitors.

The unity witnessed during the celebration of our culture that was once suppressed gives us hope that we are taking the steps towards healing from the generational trauma inflicted on Native communities.

Even though many stayed in their cars due to COVID-19 safety precautions, that didn't stop the annual celebration from taking place. Many members shared about the trauma that many have experienced as Native people and the devastation it had on our people and our culture.

During the event, you could witness the healing and revitalization of our people through prayer, songs, dancing, drumming and rattling, even at times a few horns were honked in unison. It was and is always a good day to be Native to be able to stand together in unity and be proud to continue to practice our traditions. In doing so, we can pass the teaching onto to our youth, so that their children can witness their own First Fish ceremony.

Watching the ceremony grow to this magnitude over the years holds promise that our culture will keep alive.











# Culture Department hosts c'abid (camas) harvesting events

When c'abid (camas) plants are in bloom, it's time to harvest them.

The Culture Department hosted COVIDsafe camas gathering events on May 8, 15, 17 and 19. The Tribal community was invited to help harvest the roots, which were served in the meal at the First Fish Ceremony.

Cultural Director Connie McCloud said the Tribe has an agreement that allows the Tribal community to gather in certain locations at PLU, and at the nearby Parkland Prairie, which is operated by Pierce County Parks and Recreation. The Tribe is also working on an MOU that would allow community members to gather camas on Joint Base Lewis McChord.

Squaxin Island Tribal Member Josh Mason taught participants how to dig the root. He said Lewis and Clark wrote about seas of camas in the prairies of Southwest Washington. The native plant is a traditional Coast Salish food. Its bulbs can be eaten raw, cut up in salad, cooked in soup, steamed or slow roasted.

"This was such an important part of our diet, they had wars over it," Mason said.

The Culture Department has custom-made single-pronged digging sticks that break the roots away, but camas can also be dug by hand or with a gardening trowel.

Puyallup Tribal Member Jacqueline George dug roots with her 7-year-old granddaughter Lily Gonseth (see bottom photo on this page). They laughed and enjoyed the time together. George tasted camas, but her granddaughter wasn't quite ready to try that.

"When I was a kid, we never got to learn this, so to be able to bring my granddaughter out here is an amazing thing," George said, smiling.





# New paint recycling program helps protect our natural resources

Great news! The Washington paint stewardship program launched on April 1. Through the new program, you can take unused and unwanted paint to participating drop-off locations throughout the state at no charge. These drop-off sites are available to households, businesses, government agencies, and others with leftover paint in Washington.

The Paint Stewardship Law was an eightyear effort by Zero Waste Washington, Northwest Product Stewardship Council, Product Stewardship Institute, together with many partners and municipalities, to promote an industry-supported bill that is now in effect. Washington State Rep. Strom Peterson of Edmonds championed the bill which passed in the last few days of the 2018 legislative session, and Washington is now the 10th state to enact this law the US. Under the Paint Stewardship Law, the cost of the program will be directly passed along to consumers, and a small fee will be added to each gallon of new paint sold at retail. This fee then goes to the third party nonprofit organization PaintCare.



PaintCare will fund all costs including recycling and disposal as well as reimbursement of the state Department of Ecology's expenses associated with program oversight.

#### How it works

Participating PaintCare drop-off locations, such as paint and hardware stores and transfer stations, will accept the following:

- Household paint and primers (latex for recycling or oil-based for reuse or safe disposal as a hazardous material)
- Stains
- Deck and concrete sealers
- Clear finishes (e.g., varnishes, shellac)
- The paint products accepted must be in 5-gallon containers or less and in their original container with original manufacturer label and secure lid.

#### What happens to the paint?

Latex paint can easily be recycled into a suite of colors, and the recycled paint is sold at Habitat for Humanity and other stores for about half the price of new paint. Oil paint will be offered for reuse or will be disposed of as hazardous waste.

As Puyallup Tribal Members, we can continue to protect natural resources even as new products and processes are developed by maintaining long held practices of stewardship and conservation. This new paint recycling program is another opportunity we can take advantage of to help protect our natural resources, shellfish, and salmon.

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribe has existed since creation as the aboriginal people who are the owners and guardians of their lands and waters; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribe is an independent sovereign nation, having historically negotiated with several foreign nations including the United States in the Medicine Creek Treaty; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribal Council is the governing body of the Puyallup Tribe in accordance with the authority of its sovereign rights as the aboriginal owners and guardians of their lands and waters, reaffirmed in the Medicine Creek Treaty, and their Constitution and Bylaws, as amended and approved by the Tribe and the Assistant Secretary of the Interior; and

WHEREAS, Article II and Article VI of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Puyallup Tribe grant the authority to enact ordinances governing future membership in the Tribe; and

WHEREAS, Section 1.04.120 of the Enrollment Code covers basic enrollment procedures and DNA testing of purported fathers.

The Puyallup Tribal Council amends Section 1.04.120 adding a new subsection (h) of the Enrollment Code to ensure DNA testing is pursued completely.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Section 1.04.120(h) of the Enrollment Code is revised to read as follows:

HUNTING CODE AMENDMENTS

Section 2.08.530 of the Puyallup Tribal Hunting Ordinance is being proposed for amendment. The proposed amendment will prohibit the use of infrared night vision equipment or laser sights for hunting big game such as deer or elk.

Section 12.08.540 will prohibit the use of drones to hunt. This will be a newly added section.

These amendments are posted for public comment pursuant to section 2.12.040 of the "Code Adoption, Revision, and Distribution" Ordinance. This will post for 30 days. Please provide all comments to: Secretary, Puyallup Tribal Council, 3009 East Portland Avenue, Tacoma, WA 98404.

#### PUYALLUP TRIBAL COUNCIL RESOLUTION NO. 250521

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribe has existed since creation as the aboriginal people who

are the owners and guardians of their lands and water; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribe is an independent sovereign nation, having historically negotiated with several foreign nations, including the United States in the Medicine Creek Treaty; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribal Council is the governing body of the Puyallup Tribe in accordance with the authority of its sovereign rights as the aboriginal owners and guardians of their lands and water, reaffirmed in the Medicine Creek Treaty, and their Constitution and ByLaws, as amended and approved by the Tribe and the Assistant Secretary of the Interior; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Treaty of Medicine Creek of 1854, the Puyallup Tribe ceded to the United States government substantial amounts of land of which they had used and occupied since time immemorial in the vicinity of Puget Sound and reserved certain rights inviolate of which hunting was specifically included; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribe is the sovereign government that, by necessity and in fact, has the greatest interest and concern for the wildlife resources within these hunting areas since these are valuable and essential resources which the Tribe possesses to secure its present and future existence as a Tribe; and

WHREREAS, pursuant to Articles I and VI (k) of the Puyallup Tribe's Constitution and By-laws, it is within the Puyallup Tribe's authority to regulate the taking of game animals by its tribal members within the Tribe's hunting areas, and to provide for the safe and orderly exercise of treaty secured hunting rights of Puyallup Tribal members, including the taking and possession of game animals within all open and unclaimed lands, and the Tribe's traditional hunting grounds; and

WHEREAS, the Puyallup Tribal Council amends the Puyallup Tribal Hunting Ordinance as necessary.

Approval to amend the "Puyallup Tribal Hunting Ordinance" by adding Sections 2.08.530 and 540.

(h) If a purported father is unwilling or unable to submit to DNA testing, as a last resort, other paternal relatives in the first or second degree may be tested to determine parentage. Parentage determinations and the probability of paternal parentage, are to be made by a certified DNA diagnostics laboratory, by scientific experts. A written report must be submitted and the laboratory must be approved by the Puyallup Tribe before testing occurs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all subsequent subsections shall be renumbered accordingly; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these amendments will be subject to public comment for a period of thirty (30) days as required under Section 2.12.040 of the "Code Adoption, Revision, and Distribution"; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, the Puyallup Tribal Council does hereby authorize the Chairman Bill Sterud, and in his absence, the Vice-Chairwoman Sylvia Miller to execute this Resolution and other such required implementing documents as are required on behalf of the Tribe.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Tribal Council of the Puyallup Tribe hereby adds Sections 2.08.530 and 540 to the "Puyallup Tribal Hunting Ordinance" as

2.08.530 Hunting equipment restrictions: Artificial light. (1) It is unlawful to hunt deer or elk with the aid of infrared night vision equipment or with laser sights (not to include range finders) capable of projecting a beam onto the target, while in possession or control of a firearm, bow and arrow, or crossbow. Any person who hunts with an artificial light is guilty of an offense and upon conviction shall be sentenced to:

First Offense: A minimum, mandatory fine of \$500.00; or

Second Offense: A maximum fine of \$500.00, including revocation of hunting privileges for the remainder of the hunting season, in the same season, when the first offense occurred. [Prior code § 12.02.1216]

12.08.540 Hunting with aid of aircraft, boats or other vehicles. (1) It is unlawful to use aircraft, including unmanned air-craft (drones), to spot, locate or report the location of wildlife for the purpose of hunting.

(2) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife from a vehicle, aircraft, including unmanned aircraft (drones).

(3) It is unlawful to use a vehicle, aircraft, unmanned aircraft, or motor-propelled boat for the purpose of pursuing, concentrating, or harassing any wild animal or wild bird. (5) It is unlawful to hunt game animals, game birds, or migratory birds on the day one has operated an unmanned aircraft. Any person who hunts with aid of aircraft, unmanned aircraft, boats or other vehicles is guilty of an offense and upon conviction

First Offense: A minimum, mandatory fine of \$500.00; or

Second Offense: A maximum fine of \$500.00, including revocation of hunting privileges for the remainder of the hunting season, in the same season, when the first offense occurred. [Prior code § 12.02.1216]

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these amendments will be subject to public comment for a period of thirty (30) days as required under Section 2.12.040 of the "Code Adoption, Revision, and Distribution"; and

# WIC fruit and vegetable benefits increase through September

The WIC Program (Women, Infant, and Children's Supplemental Food Program) helps support and improve the nutrition of pregnant and breastfeeding women, infants and children.

Starting June 1, the fruit and vegetable benefits for WIC participants increased to \$35 per participant for four months. Previously, the value of the fruit and vegetable voucher was \$9 for children and \$11 for women.

PTHA's WIC program is scheduling appointments in-person and through telehealth. If you are pregnant or have children under age 5, call us to see if you are eligible. You might qualify for WIC

even if you're working. WIC also provides information about feeding your family and breastfeeding.

If you are a WIC participant, please take advantage of this increased benefit.

If you know WIC participants, please encourage them to buy more fruits and vegetables with their benefit. It can make a positive difference. Call PTHA for more information 253-593-0232.

Puyallup Tribal Members, new enrolled members, and newborn babies must register at Puyallup Tribal Health Authority in order to receive services and update once a year. Please bring your tribal ID and birth certificates. You may come in person, call, e-mail, or fax documents. Any changes of personal information (address, phone number, or medical coverage) requires another update to be filed with Puyallup Tribal Health Authority.
If you do not have health insurance you need to apply or reapply for health care benefits through Washington Health Plan Finder. You may complete an application online @ www.wahealthplanfinder. Or you can call and make an appointment with the Patient Benefit Coordinator. Upon completion bring your result letter to the Puyallup Tribal Health Authority front desk. Any changes of personal information (pregnancy or change in family, gain or loss of health insurance, employment, injured on the job or major illness or injury)
Referred services is an expanded health care coverage and must have a referral for every visit outside of Puyallup Tribal Health Authority.  If you receive a letter from Referrals for an update you can call the front desk and update with a Patient Access Representative. (PAR)
If you need to update for Department of Social & Health Service (DSHS) please make an appointment with Patient Benefit Coordinator at Puyallup Health Authority.
Optometry Contact referrals to schedule an eye appointment.  Emergency/Urgent care visits. If you had to seek emergency or urgent care please e-mail or turn in your copy of discharge paperwork to referralservices@eptha.com. If you have a follow-up appointment, contact front desk to speak with a Patient Access Representative (PAR) to schedule an appointment with your provider. If you have any recommendations from your provider during your visit at ER/Urgent care, please have provider make a referral to Puyallup Tribal Health Authority.  You are required to give notification to all emergency room visits, hospital admits, and urgent care clinic visits within 72 hours of discharge.
