

# **Primary Election Results**

On April 1, more than 700 Tribal members took to the polls to cast their votes for two open seats for the 2023 Puyallup Tribal Council Primary Election. Eleven Puyallup members candidates ran for their chance to be a part of Tribal government history as they hoped to advance one step closer for an opportunity to serve on Tribal Council for a three-year term. With many members voting by absentee ballots, hundreds of others came down to Chief Leschi Schools.

Many Tribal members brought their kids to show the importance of voting. In recent years, election day has formed a sense of community, and members come and hang out and eat meals provided by food trucks from some candidates.

The election committee had an opportunity to test out a new voting machine and provided members with cookies and cupcakes after voting. Overall, the election had a great turnout, and to the right are the vote totals for the candidates. The top four move on the General Election happening later this June:

#### 9.12.080 Eligible voters.

 (b) All eligible persons must be prepared to offer proper identification in order to vote in a Tribal election. Proper identification includes any form of identification issued by the Puyallup Tribe, a state driver's license, state identification card, student identification card, federal identification card(s), medical identification card, military ID, or an employer identification card.

#### • 9.12.110 Declaration of candidacy.

All persons desiring to run for membership on the Tribal Council or for other elected Tribal office shall file a notice of candidacy in writing with the Secretary of the Puyallup Tribal Council no later than 12:00 p.m. of the 45th calendar day before the day scheduled for the primary election. Each candidate shall file on his or her own behalf and cannot be nominated by another person. Lists of the candidates for the respective office shall then be posted by the Secretary of the Tribal Council in at least three public places within the Reservation not less than 10 calendar days before the day scheduled for the primary election.

#### • 9.12.210 Electioneering and politicking.

- (a) No person shall perform any electioneering or politicking up to seven calendar days before the primary election day or general election day within the designated "no campaign" zone or obstruct the entries thereto or prevent anyone from freely entering or leaving the polling place or building. The "no campaign" zone shall be recommended by the Election Board, approved by the Tribal Council and signs will be posted at the boundary of the "no campaign" zone.
- (b) No person shall engage in politicking on Tribally owned or operated property during regular business hours as defined by each Tribal entity. If no regular hours are posted or specifically defined by the Tribal entity then the assumed hours of operation will be Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tribally owned property includes the premises of the Puyallup Tribal Housing Authority, Chief Leschi School, Puyallup Tribal Youth Center, Puyallup Tribal Health Authority, other Tribally owned businesses, buildings, or entities, and any rights-of-way maintained by the Tribe or any other locations designated by the Tribal Council.
  - » (1) Tribally owned property shall not be interpreted to mean individual Tribal members living on any Tribal trust property.
  - » (2) Politicking on Tribal property may be permitted after regular business hours at Tribally owned properties that are commonly used for public gatherings, so long as all usual procedures for reserving and utilizing such property are followed.
  - » (3) Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be issued a citation by Puyallup Tribal Law Enforcement or referred to the Prosecutor's Office.
  - » (4) Standard sized bumper stickers may be placed on personal vehicles without violating this section.


#### • 9.12.280 Absentee ballot request.

- (a) Each absentee voter shall be issued one absentee ballot, provided he or she mails a signed written request addressed to the Election Committee's post office box. Requests shall be on a form provided by the Election Board.
- (b) Each request shall include a valid return address. If no return address is included with the absentee ballot request, an absentee ballot shall not be provided. The Election Board shall not be responsible for a voter's failure to provide a valid mailing address.
- (c) Absentee ballot requests must be received no later than 9 a.m. on the date designated by the Election Board in its notice of election. The date designated by the Election Board shall be set at least 15 calendar days before the election is called. All requests shall remain in the designated post office box until 9 a.m. of the date designated by the Board. The absentee ballot requests will then be collected by a minimum of four members of the Election Board. All mailed requests received in the post office box after 9 a.m. on the date as specified by the Board shall be void.

#### • 9.12.340 Wrongful conduct.

- The following activities are prohibited and may be punishable as a criminal offense under PTC 5.12.1340 and also may result in other charges:
- (a) To give or promise any money or other remuneration to any person for the purpose of influencing that person's vote at any Tribal election, except it shall not be unlawful for any candidate to provide transportation to the polling place for any voter unless such transportation is conditioned upon on securing a vote;
- (b) To force, threaten, deceive, bribe or coerce another voter, either directly or indirectly, to influence a person's vote in any election;
- (c) To threaten a voter or a voter's family member will or may suffer financial, employment-related, bodily or other injury to influence that person's vote in any election;
- (d) To threaten an employee with dismissal from employment, reduction in pay, disciplinary action, loss of seniority, transfer, or less favorable working conditions, for the purpose of influencing such employee's vote in any election;
- (e) To influence or attempt to influence an Election Board member, Law Enforcement Officer in the performance of his/her official duties by means of bribery, force, threat, or promise of any nature;
- (f) To sign any name other than the voter's own to an absentee ballot, except in a circumstance where he/she signs for a person in the presence of and at the specific request of such person who is incapable of signing his/her own name because of physical infirmity; or
- (g) To submit more than one ballot per election for the same voter.

## Tribe Fisheries Program helps prepare for the worst-case scenario from recent blaze

The worst-case scenario was averted when it comes to the recent fire aboard the F/V Kodiak Enterprise on Hyelbos Waterway. The vessel, which is owned by Trident Seafoods, caught on fire on April 8 and remained ablaze for six days as first responders from unified command attempted to put it out.

The Puyallup Tribe's Fisheries Program was called in to help prepare for a catastrophic possibility: that the inferno could cause the boat to rupture or sink, releasing 55,000 gallons of diesel fuel into Commencement Bay.



"We were asked to come in and explain to the powers that be, the responders, what our concerns were related to habitat and potential habitat injuries," Fisheries Program Director Russ Ladley explained.

"So, we identified those areas and put a priority list together of boom deployment areas," he said. "Fortunately, we did not have to go into that mode. It sounds like things have worked out for the better thus far. There were some small amounts of what was guessed to be hydraulic fluid, but it was within the containment zone."



Puyallup Tribal Council released a statement promising to monitor the situation for potential impacts on fisheries. "Many of our Tribal members' livelihoods depend on good harvests," it read. However, Ladley did not anticipate that this year's harvest would be greatly impacted by the emergency.

"Of course, we're concerned about emissions from the fire," he said. "Some of that material falls on the water and then poses a long-term threat to marine life. What that is exactly, we may never know."

#### Original Statement from Puyallup Tribal Council regarding Kodiak Enterprise fishing boat fire from April 10, 2023.

Our emergency management and fisheries experts have joined governments' unified response to the Kodiak Enterprise fire. We are glad the crew aboard the vessel when the fire began evacuated safely.

We are monitoring the situation and impacts to our fisheries. Many of our Tribal Members' livelihoods depend on good harvests.

There are no reports of leaks into the water, but we are concerned that there is

no way to prevent them from happening. We also are concerned about air quality impacts to residents who live nearby, the risks of particulates falling into the water and access to waterways. The active and open geoduck harvest has been directly impacted, and other long-awaited fisheries openings including crabs and prawns are due in the coming days.

Many people put enormous effort over many years into cleaning up these waters. This is the second boat fire in this location in two years. We appreciate the efforts of the Coast Guard and brave first responders and of the unified command that continues to manage the situation. Safety measures must be strong enough to prevent these incidents from happening at all.

INGREDIENTS 1/2 POUND BLUE CAMAS BULBS, ABOUT A DOZEN 1 TABLESPOON OFIVE OIL 1 TABLESPOON LEMON JUICE OR WHITE WINE VINEGAR FLAKY SALT

#### INSTRUCTIONS

REMOVE THE PAPERY SHEATH OFF THE BULBS AND PUT THEM IN AN OVENPROOF CONTAINER WITH A LID. POUR IN JUST ENOUGH WATER TO COVER THE BOTTOM OF THE CONTAINER BY ABOUT 1/4 INCH OR SO. COVER THE CONTAINER AND BAKE THE CAMAS BULBS AT 220-230 DEGREES FOR 12 HOURS. CHECK ON THEM AFTER 8 HOURS OR SO. YOU WANT THEM TO LOOK ANYTHING FROM PALE GOLD TO FULL GOLDEN

SLICE THE BULBS INTO RINGS AND LIGHTLY DUST THEM WITH FINE SALT. SAUTE THEM IN OLIVE OIL, BUTTER OR SOME OTHER FAT UNTIL THEY BROWN, THEY WILL BE A LITTLE STICKY, SO KEEP THE PAN MOVING FOR THE FIRST MINUTE OR SO TO PREVENT THE BULBS FROM STICKING TO THE PAN, KEEP AN EYE ON THEM, AS THE SUGARS IN THE CAMAS WILL CARAMELIZE FAST.

TO FINISH, TO88 WITH THE LEMON JUICE AND DUST WITH THE FLAKY SALT, EAT AT ONCE.

CAMAS NEEDS TO BE COOKED SLOWLY AND FOR A LONG TIME BEFORE YOU DO ANYTHING ELSE WITH IT. IF YOU SKIP THIS STEP, ALL THE INULIN IN THE BULB WILL STILL BE PRESENT, SLOW, MOIST COOKING BREAKS THE INULIN DOWN INTO FRUCTOSE, COOK THE BULBS AT 220 DEGREES FOR 12 HOURS TO GET TO A POINT WHERE THE BULBS WERE STILL SAVORY, BUT WITH A HINT OF SWEETNESS LIKE A PARSNIP.

## **#1 Ranked Free-ride Snowboarder in the PNW** gets invite to the North American Championship

Puyallup Tribal member Devon Bryan has been competing in freeride snowboarding since he was 10 years old. The International Freeskiers & Snowboarders Association (IFSA) is the junior and feeder program for the Freeride World Tour (FWT). The FWT is a competitive freerider's ultimate goal and can compete in this event once they are 18.

Devon had a busy and fabulous competitive season this year traveling and riding in three regional and three national competitions, while maintaining a 3.0 or higher GPA at Tacoma Online. Devon placed No. 1 in the Pacific Northwest region. Based on his competitive rankings, Devon qualified for the 2023 North American Championships (NorAms)! The NorAms was held in Golden BC during April at the Kicking Horse Mountain Resort. The IFSA NorAm Championship is an invite only event for the top ranked IFSA junior athletes aged 12 to 18 in the Western Hemisphere. The IFSA will invite the top 175 competitors out of over 3,000 IFSA junior athletes in North America. After a tough competition, our very own Devon is ranked No. 6 in all of North America. The NorAm rankings then determine who advances to the Freeride Junior World Championships (FJWC) in Europe.









Freeriders in Canada and America at the 2023 IFSA North American Junior Freeride Championship Running April 5-9, you'll join the most talented riders in the Western Hemisphere for an opportunity to vie for the 2023 IFSA North American Championship title and an invitation to

the 2024 Freeride Junior World Championships in Europe



Freeriding is a lesser known style of snowboarding and skiing that uses natural terrain as a competitive field. A freerider typically has first aid, avalanche and mountain terrain safety training. Freeriders drop in from the mountain tops and navigate through nature using

natural challenges like chutes, drops, cliffs, and trees to perform jumps and tricks. These riders showcase their best skill and creativity on a chosen line down the mountain. Freeriding does not use artificial obstacles such as kickers, ramps, rails or halfpipes. A freerider descends a predetermined section of a mountain

while judges rank them on line choice, degree of difficulty, style and control.

Devon wants to thank all of his supporters! He is stoked and will proudly represent his Tribe and the Pacific Northwest region in this event! Congratulations and keep shredding!

Mary Elizabeth Miles Frank Written by Lorelei Frank Evans and Cathy T. Tougaw

HISTORY: This is information is about our mother, Mary Miles Frank, who was the director of the first Puyallup Tribal Museum. In order to talk about the original Puyallup Tribal Museum and how our Mother was involved in its conception, it's important to understand who Mary Miles Frank was.

Mary was born on August 19, 1933 and raised at Franks Landing in Nisqually Washington. Her parents were Rose Fredericks and David Miles, Sr. Mary had seven children, Steve Miles, Lorelei Frank Evans, Mitchell Frank, David Miles, Cathy Tougaw, Bruce Frank, Pamela Burr and numerous Grandchildren, Great Grandchildren and Great-great Grandchild. Mary Miles Frank passed away on October 1, 2009.

Mary was a warrior woman who fought for Indian Fishing rights most of her life on the Nisqually River along with Billie Frank Jr., and so many warrior women and men that it's impossible to name them all. In the '60s, Mary's home was the command base for many of the native men and women that were fighting for fishing rights on the Puyallup River. Many of them would eat, bathe and rest before going back down to the river to continue their fight. Some of them were armed and risked their safety and freedom for what they believed in. We must never forget these brave native men and women who fought for tribal rights to ensure a future for our people. We must honor those who sacrifice so much so we can have a better life.

When the Puyallup Tribe took possession of the Cascadia Building in the 1970s and set up the tribal government administration, Mary Frank and Judy Wright worked together researching the history of the Puyallup Tribe, and they developed a plan and received a grant for the implementation of a museum at the tribal building. In the late 1970s, the first Puyallup Tribal Museum was open to the public. Judy Wright and Mary Frank collected artifacts, pictures and stories from many of the tribal elders at the time. When the museum opened, Judy Wright became the director of Historic Preservation and Mary Miles Frank became the director of the first Puyallup Tribal Museum. Mary was a dedicated employee of the Puyallup Tribe of Indians for over thirty years as the Museum Director. She was also appointed by the Puyallup Tribal Council on the Housing Authority Board of Directors, Election Committee and numerous other committee and boards.

Many tribal members would visit Mary at the museum searching for information on their family tree and culture and history of the Puyallup Tribe. Mary also had an abundance of knowledge of native natural medicine and would bring princess pine, to the tribe for tribal members with certain medical problems. Mary always took time for anyone who would come into the museum searching for answers about our culture, history and language. She believe that it was important for future generations to never forget who we are as Puyallup Tribal people.

Mary also taught people, on her own time, who were interested in Chinook Jargon, which was the universal language of some of the tribes in the area. She also taught basket weaving, beading, making baby boards and so much more.

I was so impressed by the Historic Preservation staff, Connie McCloud and the Cultural Department and the wonderful speech by Chairman, Bill Sterud and Councilman, Fred Dillon, in honoring our Mother, Mary Miles Frank and Judy Wright at the new mini museum launched. I also wanted to thank our cousins, Norma Eagle Speaker and family for their words and memories in honoring our mother. I look forward to the opening of the large museum in the next year or so. We thank all of you for the excellent job honoring these two great women.



On Memorial Day, May 29, at 10 a.m., the Puyallup Tribal Veterans will be holding a Memorial Day Ceremony at the Puyallup Tribal Veterans Memorial, which is located in front of the Puyallup Tribal Health Authority. 

## Hepatitis C Screening and Treatment

Greetings, from PTHA! Did you know that American Indian/ Alaska Natives (Al/ AN) have the highest rates of Hepatitis C when compared to



any other ethnic group? Not only that, but Al/AN individuals are 2.7 times more likely to die from Hepatitis C than non-Hispanic whites? While this is certainly scary, PTHA is proud to remind our community that we have the resources to identify those affected AND treat!

#### FACTS:

 Hepatitis C is a virus that can be caught several ways including sharing needles, razors, toothbrushes, unregulated tattooing, being born to an HCVinfected mother, or even having a blood transfusion before 1990.

- Most of those affected do NOT have symptoms, but some symptoms include feeling tired, nauseous, achy, and/or have a poor appetite.
- This virus can stick around for many years, damaging your liver; over time, some may notice their skin or eyes appearing yellow, legs swelling, and feeling short of breath or confused.

PTHA offers patients hepatitis C screening at our lab with a simple blood test. If it is positive, we have you return for some additional blood work (it can all be done at the same time); some may also need a quick ultrasound of the liver. Once we have this information, we speak with specialists who recommend the correct treatment. We are excited to say that PTHA can obtain the medicines and offer treatment in a familiar setting, here at your clinic!

# Changing Seasons, Worsening Allergies

As we begin to see the seasons change, many people will also begin to notice a change in their well-being. Allergy season is approaching. Allergens in the



environment – both outside and indoors – can cause your immune system to overreact, leading to inflammation that causes some annoying and persistent symptoms. Allergies can start at any time in life, and some people may not know that the symptoms they are experiencing are allergies. stuffy or runny nose.

- Fluid draining out of your nose can leave either through your nostrils or down the back of your throat, leading to irritation of both. If you have this "postnasal drip" feeling in your throat, you may experience a cough or hoarse voice.
- Inflammation and swelling in the affected tissue can lead to fluid buildup in areas in your face that you can't see, leading to sinus pressure around your nose and eyes.

#### TREATMENT

The most useful treatment for allergies is removal or avoidance of whatever you are sensitive to.

 At home, this may involve cleaning more regularly to reduce the amount of dust, dust mites, and animal dander present, especially on carpet and upholstery

- Air purifiers with HEPA filters are helpful in ridding the air of allergens that you would otherwise breathe in.
- In addition, decreasing humidity in your house can lower the amount of dust mites present. If you suffer from a dry nose, you should use saline nasal spray and lower the temperature of your house instead of using a room humidifier.

When this is not enough to control your allergies, you may want to start talking to your doctor about options for medication. There are many effective non-drowsy oral allergy medications, called antihistamines, that your doctor may recommend for relief. There are also nasal sprays that have proven to be effective even in severe cases of allergies.

If you are experiencing these symptoms and are hoping to stay well this season, be sure to speak to your doctor during your next appointment to address your allergies. And keep in mind that you can take steps to minimize these symptoms even within your own home.

#### SYMPTOMS

Symptoms can strike fast. Some of the most common symptoms could include:

- Uncontrollable sneezing, difficulty breathing through your nose, and a

- Wash your sheets and pillowcases regularly using hot or warm water, and encase pillows and mattresses with covers that are impenetrable to allergens.
- Vacuum your carpet at least once per week, ideally using a vacuum cleaner with a HEPA filter.

### Program gives Tribal members hands-on trade experience

The Iron Workers Apprenticeship program offers opportunities for those interested in making a career in the trades. Eric Sanchez, Assistant Training Coordinator, recently processed 14 applicants who, after successfully completing a fourweek course, will get direct entry into an apprenticeship and their very first dispatch for a job with iron workers. Applicants will go through an intake including a written test of general knowledge followed by hands-on skills including rebar packing, knots, and rebar ties. After completion of all the stations. the scores will be tallied to see who will be admitted to the program. The most recent class started on April 3 and is being taught by Ryan Rivers.

"We don't care who you are, what your background is, if you got heart and can do the work, we want you," explains Jack Laher, Apprenticeship Coordinator for Iron Workers Local #86. Previously, he was an instructor, where he met Nisqually tribal member Derek Youckton who was in his first-year apprenticeship course at the time. The recent federal infrastructure package has brought lots of work to the area, mainly on tribal lands. Working with TERO was a natural fit for expanding the apprenticeship program. Laher and Youckton want to help get out the word about this opportunity for tribal members to create a secure future for themselves and their families. Once the four-year apprenticeship program is completed, they will become journeymen, all the while building their pension and getting excellent health insurance benefits.

Isaac Bennett likes to work with his hands. stay active, and stay outside. He began the Pre-Apprenticeship Program in 2020 and is now a Third Year Apprentice at Local 86. He recommends this path to those who don't know what to do after high school and as a viable alternative to college. His hard work is being rewarded with good pay and benefits, allowing him to achieve financial stability. He's proud to be contributing to the economic growth that depends on iron workers. As he explained it: any concrete structure has rebar, any building over 3 stories has structural steel. Another important element to Bennett is the sense of community among iron workers. As he puts it, "everyone has your back" and no one





judges you. If you are willing to work hard, iron workers will take you in and take care of you. He highly recommends the program, which is open to all tribal members. # The Puyallup Tribe breaks ground on a brand new Tribal Administration building

About 100 people turned out on a cold Friday morning for a ceremony held for Tribal community members and employees on March 24. Heritage Manager Connie McCloud gave a blessing, and the Culture Department sang. Then Tribal Councilmembers shared their thoughts about the site's history, the new building's importance and how it represents the Tribes growth. Noting the decades since administrative functions took place out of trailer space.

Chairman Bill Sterud and other councilmembers noted that the old Cascadia center, once Cushman Indian Hospital, once towered over the area. The Tribe occupied Cascadia in the 1970s and used it for administration until it was torn down and replaced by modern facilities.

The four-story, 95,000-square-foot administration building is the first phase of redevelopment for the 17.6-acre site of the former Emerald Queen casino tents in Tacoma. It is scheduled to be completed in 2024 and include a four-story parking garage. Plans for future phases include a museum and an entertainment district.

"With this new building, we are excited for the future of our Tribe and the future of this area," said the Puyallup Tribal Council, the Tribe's governing body, before the groundbreaking. "This new administration building gives our membership and employees an exceptional location for business."

Wright Runstad & Company is the Tribe's development manager for the project. Freiheit Architecture designed the building, and JTM Construction, whose clients include Evergreen Health and Tacoma Art Museum, is the builder.





















The new Tribal administration building is the latest in a series of economic development initiatives the Tribe has launched since 2020, when it opened its new \$400 million Emerald Queen Casino in Tacoma. In 2021, the Tribe announced a partnership with Amazon on a sort center, opened the EQC hotel in Tacoma, launched the BetMGM @ EQC sportsbook and opened a fourth Commencement



Bay Cannabis store. In 2022, the Tribe announced partnerships with Kenmore Air to operate a seaplane service and with celebrity chef Roy Yamaguchi to open a Native-inspired international cuisine waterfront restaurant. Earlier this year, the Tribe launched its own international logistics company, Tahoma Global Logistics.

Heritage Division Manager Connie McCloud reminded everyone that the things brought into the museum have a spirit, a voice that tells us who we are and who we came from.

Chairman Bill Sterud said the exhibits will help make sure our history is not forgotten, that it will be carried with us every day-by this and the next generations. He wanted everyone to walk around and enjoy the exhibits, to feel good about themselves and their heritage. It was noted that there will never again be a time where our children will not have a place to learn about their history.

The Historic Preservation Department thanked everyone who helped make this event happen and who participated in the activities. The celebration ended with a cedar branch cleansing and blessing of the walkway.

### Cultural activities help Re-Entry participants rebound from addiction

Edie Holland fondly recalls making her first drum in third grade. "I think it's cool that, in our culture, the first thing you make you're supposed to give to somebody that you love," says Holland, an enrolled Puyallup Tribal member. "So, I gifted my first drum to my sister. She gifted her first drum to me."

"So it was a win-win situation," she adds, grinning broadly. "I still got a drum."

Tapping back into that childhood joy has helped her rebound from troubled times lately. Holland and some of her newest friends gather around a long table in the basement of the Puyallup Tribe's Re-Entry house in Fife. They stretch wet deer hide, attach it to wooden frames and stack dozens of freshly made drums on a shelf nearby.

The Re-Entry program helps Tribal members whose lives have been derailed by addiction get back on track. On a recent afternoon, participants are rushing to meet the deadline for 150 drums they plan to give to children who will attend the Gathering of Native Americans spring break camp at Chief Leschi Schools. Holland is newly sober and credits this type of cultural crafting activity with helping her feel centered as she puts her life back together.

"I don't know if it's important to everybody else," Holland says, "but it's definitely important for me to be able to reconnect with my culture at the same time I'm in recovery."

Carlos West echoes that sentiment. He wrestled with drugs and alcohol before getting sober in 2009. These days, he works with Re-Entry as a navigator, steering clients toward resources they need to return to normal. Through the program, he has learned to make smudge kits, which he says make him feel more in touch with his heritage.

when we're out there drinking, using drugs and living that life, we're completely disconnected from everybody. So, that's what we offer. We offer connection."

"What I feel is truly unique about the Tribal Re-Entry program is the cultural piece," Director Mona Miller says. "Besides the Native American recovery groups, we also involve all of our participants in community events that are going on. Last year, we participated in Canoe Journey. We had participants in the Native American Heritage Day who performed at Mariners games. We do this with the Culture Department. We couldn't do any of this without them."

Miller launched the program in March 2020, inspired by author Don Coyhis' Wellbriety Movement — a recovery program tailored toward Native Americans — and her own past struggles with substance abuse. She got started just in time for most business to grind to a halt due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Services still needed to be provided," she recalls. "So, I worked out of the back of my car. I went to their (clients') homes to work. I was on the phone a lot. I just kept providing services the best that I could." Danny Leonard, for example, went from being a client to working for Re-Entry as a peer specialist. "I've been sober for just under two years," he says. "This was part of my transition. I'm just here to try to give back to my people. That's pretty much my reward, seeing people reach their goals and get some sanity back in their life."

Navigators and peer counselors help beneficiaries obtain resources that are necessary to stabilize program participants' lives — everything from job leads to help getting a driver's license reinstated.

"The first couple of barriers they usually have is they don't have housing. So we're able to help with that," Re-Entry Navigator Samantha "Jo Jo" Pettibon says. "This program is something I wish I had when I first got sober, because we really help people so they can focus on their recovery."

Re-Entry is also a place where people recovering from addiction can go for other types of support. Meetings take place at the group's headquarters on Mondays and Thursdays with meals served beforehand. The participants end with singing and drumming. Holland says ths support and camaraderie have become central to her social life.

"It's connected me to my spirituality on a deeper level," West says. "In contrast, West was Miller's first hire in December 2021, and her team has since grown to five. She makes a point of hiring people who have been successful in overcoming their own struggles. "I want to have a team that's built on personal experience and empower them — give them opportunities that they normally wouldn't get anywhere else," she says. "I'm a lot more positive now. I'm a lot more open," Holland says. "It just warms my heart ... to see the newcomers that are coming from the treatment center. Every time I come, I always see people that I know, and it's just great. It's a great program."

## UWT opens new exhibit with Puyallup Tribal land acknowledgement

Members of the Puyallup Tribe visited the University of Washington Tacoma on April 10 to help unveil a new historical exhibit and Tribal land acknowledgment plaque that are on display near the entrance of the university's recently opened Milgard Hall.

"Tacoma Timber History" traces the harvesting of lumber in this region back to the Puyallup Tribe's centuries-long reliance on cedar to make everything from baskets and clothing to the longhouses that Tribal members lived in.

UWT Professor and former Chancellor Mark Pagano led efforts to construct the exhibit, working with Puyallup Tribe Heritage Division Manager Connie McCloud and local historian Michael Sullivan.

The display includes historical photos, illustrations, maps, paddles carved by Michael "Muck" Hall, of the Tribe's Cultural Center, and research by "The People of Cascadia: Pacific Northwest Native American History" author Heidi Bohan.

McCloud spoke at the unveiling event and members of the Language Program and Culture Department blessed the exhibit, performing and dancing to the songs "Floor Blessing" and "Honor Song."

"Our people had to move those great cedar trees to the sites where our villages were and then to construct a longhouse," McCloud said. "They had that ability to work together to build them, and our long houses would stay for hundreds of years."

McCloud described the time before contact with settlers as an era of prosperity, when local tribes flourished due to an abundance of food and other resources.

















"But the railroad changed everything," she said. "It began the removal of our people from our longhouses, and it was not a simple removal. They burned them down. They burned our canoes, and any evidence of our culture, and our people were also moved to other reservations.

"They attempted to remove us completely from our land, that relationship that we had since the beginning of time. Then came the forced removal of children into boarding schools and away from our families. It was a time of great loss for our people, our culture."

Pagano, Sullivan and UWT Chancellor Sheila Edwards also delivered remarks at the exhibit's debut. "We're acknowledging the past, but we're also acknowledging the present and the future for what we would like to see here at our university," Edwards said.



### **ARTICLE II – MEMBERSHIP**

### Section 1.

The membership of the Puyallup Tribe shall consist of each individual who is not enrolled as a member in any other Indian nation, tribe, band, pueblo, village, corporation or rancheria and who satisfies either of the following requirements:

 Each person whose name appears on the roll of the Puyallup Tribe approved in 1929; and

(b) Each person at least one of whose parents, at the time of the person's birth, was an enrolled member of the Puyallup Tribe;

(i) Provided, however, that after the effective date of Amendment Number XIII to this Constitution (amending this Article II), a person who otherwise qualifies under this subsection shall be eligible only if application for enrollment is made within one calendar year after his or her birth; and

(ii) Provided, further, that in the case of a person actually unaware of his/her Puyallup ancestry by reason of adoption or other circumstances, the time deadline contained in proviso number (i), above, shall be deemed satisfied if that individual makes application for membership within ninety (90) days after becoming aware of his/her Puyallup ancestry.

Membership under this Article shall not be deemed automatic but shall be effective only upon compliance with enrollment procedures then in effect including action by the Tribal Council confirming an individual's eligibility and enrollment.
