Councilwoman gives testimoney for MMIWP

Councilwoman Anna Bean gives testimony in favor of HB 1177 to the state Legislature's Community Safety, Justice, & Reentry Committee on Jan. 17, 2023. The bill would create a missing and murdered indigenous women and people cold case investigations unit. "We have opportunities daily to give light to those in some of the darkest of places," Councilwoman Bean said. "Today we have the opportunity to give light and warmth to cases that have now turned cold. ... We're talking about lives—lives that have

Councilmembers make the case for school HVAC funding

The Tribe's bid to secure state funding for a new school HVAC system moved ahead on Jan. 5 when Vice Chairwoman Sylvia Miller, Councilmembers James Rideout and Monica Miller, and Chief Leschi Schools Superintendent Marc Brouillet presented the project to the Pierce County Legislative Delegation.

The meeting at Clover Creek Technical College in Lakewood took place at the state lawmakers' invitation. At stake: state funding to replace a failing, outdated HVAC system that has caused major water pipe leaks, too-hot or too-cold classrooms and a shortage of fresh, outside air.

Cost to replace: an estimated \$31 million.

The project cleared a major hurdle in late 2022 when Gov. Inslee included \$15 million in his proposed 2023-33 10-year capital plan. Now it needs to go through the monthslong legislative process, and gain approval from the state Legislature.


"This is such an important project," Vice Chairwoman Miller said to the elected officials. "When other public schools have a major capital improvement, they can issues bonds and levies to pay for their needed upgrades. But we lack that ability, even though we are considered a public school under state law."

Capital improvement problems are further hampered by the historic underfunding of the federal Bureau of Indian Education, which otherwise might have supported improvements years ago. Chief Leschi Schools was built in 1996 but has received little funding to maintain its systems. The HVAC system is original to the building. According to the project team, the school's HVAC equipment has been in place nearly double the industry standard for end of useful life of such equipment.

A frustration expressed by the councilmembers is that with the Puyallup Tribe being one of the most urban reservations in the country, most members do not live on trust land—yet pay property taxes that benefit their local school districts. If they send their own children to Chief Leschi, their property taxes do not follow.

A new HVAC system will not only provide effective heating and cooling of classrooms

Chief Leschi Schools' HVAC system is long past the end of its useful life.

but allow the use of outside air and reduce carbon emissions by 98 percent. If approved, work for the secondary schools can begin as early as summer 2024, with the elementary school, gym and cafeteria following in 2025.

Increased construction costs already are affecting the project. The 2022 estimate of \$24.5 million has already increased by over 20 percent. If approved, the state capital funding would cover about half the cost. The rest of the needed funding might come through COVID relief funds and a small-schools modernization grant the Tribe is pursuing.

The state Legislature is scheduled to vote on the state's final budget on April 23.

Puyallup Tribe launches new logistics company



PUYALLUP RESERVATION, Tacoma, Wash.—The Puyallup Tribe has launched its own international logistics company, Tahoma Global Logistics (website: TahomaGlobal.com).

The new company will focus on land operations to leverage the Tribe's properties along the Blair Waterway in Tacoma, which were regained in the 1990 Land Claims Settlement. Initial services will include container movement, storage and maintenance, bulk material handling, heavy equipment fitting, transloading services, inspection, maintenance, and short-haul pickup and delivery trucking. The Tribe's property provides customers convenient port access as well as registered foreign trade zone status.

"This is an exciting development for us on our journey to securing the future of generations to come," said the Puyallup Tribal Council, the Tribe's governing body. "The name reflects our outlook: We are a Tribe that thinks on a global scale. Tahoma Global Logistics will continue our economic development efforts, provide revenue to our government and over time will open workforce opportunities to our Membership."

Tahoma Global Logistics is the latest in a series of economic development initiatives the Tribe has launched since 2020, when it opened its new \$400 million Emerald



Queen Casino in Tacoma. In 2021, the Tribe announced a partnership with Amazon on a sort center, opened the EQC hotel in Tacoma, launched the BetMGM @ EQC sportsbook and opened a fourth Commencement Bay Cannabis store. In 2022, the Tribe announced partnerships with Kenmore Air to operate a seaplane service and with celebrity chef Roy Yamaguchi to open a Native-inspired international cuisine waterfront restaurant.



February is National Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month (TDVAM).

This is an issue that impacts everyone in our community, not just teens. Together we can raise our community's awareness about teen dating violence and promote safe and healthy relationships. Teen dating violence is an **Adverse Childhood Experience** that affects millions of young people in the United States. Dating violence can take place in person, online, or through technology such as cell phones. Unhealthy, abusive, or violent relationships can have short and long term negative effects, including severe consequences, on a developing teen.

Youth who are victims of teen dating violence are more likely to:

- experience depression and anxiety symptoms

- engage in unhealthy behaviors, like using tobacco, drugs, and alcohol

- exhibit antisocial behaviors, like lying,

25% of those who experience dating violence in the LGBTQ+ community ever report the abuse.

of teens who were in an abusive relationship ever told anyone about the abuse.

ONLY 33%

in the US report experiencing some kind of abuse in their romantic relationships, including verbal and emotional abuse.

Among US high school students who dated in the past year, the prevalence of physical dating violence was higher among gay, lesbian, and bisexual students (17.5%) and students who identified as 'not sure' (24.5%) than heterosexual students (8.3%).

- Make your calories count by eating a heart-healthy diet high in fresh fruits and vegetables and low in sodium and trans fat.

Most importantly, the support you receive does not end with your conversation; Veterans Crisis Line responders will connect you with resources that can help when you are in distress. No matter what you are experiencing, the Veterans Crisis Line has the local resources and support systems to help get your life back on track.

What are the signs of crisis?

The end of a personal relationship. The loss of a job. Everybody faces difficult times in life, and people cope with stressful situations in different ways. When emotional issues reach a crisis point, contact the Veterans Crisis Line.

Learn to Recognize Signs

Every Veteran is different, and many may not show any signs of intent to harm themselves. But some actions and behaviors can be a sign that they need help.

Crisis Signs

These signs require immediate attention. If you are experiencing any of these and

- Appearing sad or depressed most of the time
- Hopelessness

ARTICLE II – MEMBERSHIP

Section 1.

The membership of the Puyallup Tribe shall consist of each individual who is not enrolled as a member in any other Indian nation, tribe, band, pueblo, village, corporation or rancheria and who satisfies either of the following requirements:

 Each person whose name appears on the roll of the Puyallup Tribe approved in 1929; and

(b) Each person at least one of whose parents, at the time of the person's birth, was an enrolled member of the Puyallup Tribe;

(i) Provided, however, that after the effective date of Amendment Number XIII to this Constitution (amending this Article II), a person who otherwise qualifies under this subsection shall be eligible only if application for enrollment is made within one calendar year after his or her birth; and

(ii) Provided, further, that in the case of a person actually unaware of his/her Puyallup ancestry by reason of adoption or other circumstances, the time deadline contained in proviso number (i), above, shall be deemed satisfied if that individual makes application for membership within ninety (90) days after becoming aware of his/her Puyallup ancestry.

Membership under this Article shall not be deemed automatic but shall be effective only upon compliance with enrollment procedures then in effect including action by the Tribal Council confirming an individual's eligibility and enrollment.



- Is your street on the TTP street inventory for future road work?
- What are your transportation needs, questions, and concerns?

The Planning Department is currently reviewing the TTP inventory which include but are not limited to roads within Tacoma, Fife, Milton, Edgewood, Puyallup and unincorporated Pierce County.
